Dear Tomo:

I was unable to persuade Tad Fujii to appear before the block managers, to an unfortunate accident. Tad's father attended the meeting held last Saturday a week ago to arrange for the coming of the Spanish consul in the latter part of December, at the invitation of the block managers. One block manager is alleged to have seid to Mr. Fujii that he should not have permitted Ted to let himself be played for a sucker by someone else who was keeping hidden and staying out of harm's way. Both Tad and Mr. Fujii have all along stoutly maintained that Tad wrote the letter himself on his own hook, and therefore this statement did not soother Mr. Fujii's feelings much. When Mr. Fujii replied that Tad himself had written the letter and that he was not being played as a sucker, another block manager is said to have stated that Tad couldn't have written it, that he was too dumb to have written a letter like that. Mr. Fujii became quite resentful at such a slur on Tad's ability, but kept his temper, according to the report of the matter given me. When he told Tad of the incident, however, Tad became thoroughly angry. He came to me and told me about the incident as he understands it. He said that he was through with the whole business of trying to placate the block managers, that he was not out to make trouble, but that he felt that there was no need for him to apologize for anything that he had done, that if he tried further difficulties would undoubtedly arise, and that he is therefore not going to do anything about the whole matter, in yiew of the attitude of the block managers in speaking to his father.

This result is somewhat unfortunate, particularly in view of the rather decent writeup given the block managers and councilmen in both the nihongo and the eigo sections of the Pioneer last week. I happen to know that the Pioneer editors were under no pressure to print the statements from Mr. Lindley and Mr. Johnson. and that they printed these statements of their own free will as a factual statement of the relationship of our community governmental officials to the community. These statements, the conditions under which they were printed, and the remarks made about them by the Pioneer editors while they were in preparation, are, it seems to me. s pretty clear indication that the Pioneer staff, or at least its editors, are not trying to sttack or injure the reputation of the block managers or councilmen, and that they are just as ready to point out to the community the appreciation which is due these officials for the services they do as they are to call attention to any other aspect of their functions in the community.

In view of my inability to secure any further concessions from Ted Fujii, and in view of the fact that the Fioneer has given the block managers a pat on the sack for their services to the community, I suggest that we try to forget the whole ousiness without further ado. I hope that the block managers will be able to accept this suggestion as a sincere recommendation from an earnest friend who feels that this will really result in the best for them. I shall drop around to your house about 8:15



Thursday morning and see what you think of it. I shall not be on the project Wednesday. FORVICTORY and I have been so busy with various meetings and appointments that I could BUY not get away today or yesterday to see you or Mr. Okubo about the matter. If you want me to report these results to the block managers on Thursday WAR morning, I shall be at your service, or if you have any other suggestions states I shall be glad to hear them at that time. I thought it beat to let you know what the situation is, so that you could take whatever steps you feel desirable.

A number of inquiries have been received in this Office from various individuals relative to the military service of Americans of Japanese descent. The instructions received from the Embassy in this matter are as follows:

> "The Protecting Fower is not authorised to act on behalf of Allerican citizens, and it is solely with the American Authorities that they ( the American citizens)must deal in these matters (American military service), since these Authorites are the only ones who can solve such problems."

May I also point out - as has been frequently and repeatedly emphasized by the Spanish Delegates in their visits to the various Centers that the above mentioned memorandum is not limited only to military service, but to anything that concerns Allerican citizens. They must approach their own American Authorities, not the Protecting Power, whose duties are towards the Japanese nationals in the United States.

At our first committee meeting the following suggestions were primarily made for your consideration:

- I To take full advantage of Federal Angencies such as Farm Security Administration or Reconstruction Finance Corporation, etc., evacuees should be fully informed of their functions. Therefore, we would like the War Relocation Authority to invite responsible officers to the center to deliver their messages. Particularly is this beneficial if San Francisco or Los Angeles offices were contacted, pending re-opening of coast area to us.
- II Referring to the above, we recommend the Administration to utilize as many WRA officials, in various agencies mentioned, who have had close contact, experience and interest with the evacuees and their problems to aid us financially most effectively.
- III Through Relocation Committee, WRA and evacuees continuously study the problems and make a policy according to needs and changes, to meet the requirements and desires.

Our committee will be glad to meet with you and study further at any time.

Resignation of Eroshi Lemmoteu as Block Hanager of 12

About the middle of December, 1944. I came to Mr. Kennotsu's home and discussed with him the desirability of him transferring to another job in the Center. He stated that he would be willing to do so, but asked that he be permitted to remain as Block Manager during the New Year celebrations. I consented to this and told him that that would be all right. I asked him at that time, however, what type of work he would be interested in doing in the Center, and when I came back to the office I discussed with Mr. Ben Okubo of the Exployment Section the fact that he might be leaving in the near future and to find a good place for him in the offices if he desired to work in the offices. Mr. Okubo did not call upon Mr. Kenmoteu until about the 20th of January. At that time Wr. Kenmotsu stated that he did not want a transfer but he wanted to be terminated, and then he would go to another job possibly to the Fire Department. Consecuently, we wrote to your Block Advisors on January 27, 1945. "Ating that Mr. Menmoten was leaving the position of Block Manager for some other bob. We asked you at that time to have a block meeting and select at least two nominees for the position of Block Manager. You will remember that your block had a meeting in which Mr. Kennotsu attended and discussed the possibility of a new Block Following this meeting, Mr. Kermoteu mailed me his written resignation Manager. as Block Manager. Under the circumstances, his resignation was not absolutely necessary because he stated to Mr. Okubo that he desired to be terminated; however, we would like for you to know that Mr. Menmoteu did hand in his written resignation. We made an official request to the Employment Section for Mr. Kenndst's termination. This termination was made by them, affective at the end of business, January 31, 1945. Since that time your block has been without a Block Manager.

Will you please attend the Block Managers' meeting on February 5, 1945, so that your block might have an official representative at this meeting. We would appreciate knowing whether or not your Block Advisors are interested in coming to my office and discussing this matter, or do they desire to call another meeting to select nominees for the position of Block Manager. In case they do not desire to participate further in the securing of nominees for the position of Block Manager, this office will, of course, have to make an appointment from what advice we can secure through our regular advisors.

Will you please let me know the block's wishes concerning the nomination of a new Block Manager?
