A few meetings have been held to


make plans for the Council and as time goes on, things will be organized.

EPISCOPAL GROUP NEWS



Mr. Peter Okada, a faithful worker of the Holiness Church, left for Boystown, Neb. on Monday, Oct. 26th.


MESSAGE FROM THE HILLS.


THE BROADMAN'S HYMNALS ARE HERE


AMACHE CHRISTIAN CHURCH SCHOOLS (No. 1)

every week, in fact they change so rapidly that we can never catch up with the events.

More efficient the teachers, the more possibilities for them to resettle into outside communities. In fact there was a week when two to four teachers left the camp at once Yes many are leaving. We may have to invite a Caucasian missionary who may work in this ever changing camp as a permanent leader and worker.




